

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

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Message From The Acting Principal Jamaica College



It is my pleasure to greet you on behalf of the Jamaica College School Community.

Firstly, I wish to commend you on maintaining this excellent tradition of the annual Ziadie Cup. I was fortunate to be at JC when coach Dennis Ziadie introduced total football to JC and Jamaica. We produced two special

teams playing a brand of rotating football that was fascinating and mesmerizing. I had boyhood idols of: Donovan Brown, Maxie Coleman, Jimmy Sinclair, Gregory Reid, Norman Pennycooke, Stephen Bond, Martin Woodstock, Luke Whitney, Ian Gage, Tony and Johnny Chang, Horatio Mitchell and Herbie Nelson. A number of those ballers could easily have won the present Ziadie Scholarship and I haven't mentioned scholarly reserves like Earl Markes. I therefore have a special connection with the late great coach.

I have completed one eventful term as Acting Principal of Jamaica College and began my mandate to build on the efforts of the last ten years.

I am a JC Old Boy with blue blood. I have been a member of the Board for the last eleven years and so this has been a reasonably smooth transition. My main focus is to lead and manage a process of academic transformation geared towards a minimum pass rate of 90% for all external examinations. While there other deliverables, this is my first and main focus.

We have begun by reducing the class size of all Mathematics and English classes in the school, so that they are now at 20 -25 students maximum, down from over 40. We expect this to impact our overall performance in a year. We are reviewing our academic processes and working with the staff to improve in all areas.

The first term saw the deaths of two students from the same class -3C. Jordan Miller from heart failure and Nicholas Francis was murdered while going home from school. These deaths, along with that of footballer, Dominic James shook our school and country. We, as a school, tried to learn from these experiences and made adjustments to our day to day operations. This included the need to become even more security and health conscious including

screening all footballers/athletes representing the school. This process has been lengthy and expensive but very necessary.

We won the Manning Cup and the Olivier Shield for the fourth year in a row. Our team played the best brand of football and had we taken more shots throughout the season, we would probably have won all four cups. We also performed creditably in the Under 16 football competition losing in the semis. Our basketballers reached the Under 16 finals and in Hockey, we are 5-time defending champions and are still unbeaten. We have performed creditably in every competition entered including Golf and Lacrosse.

Our school band has won several medals at the recent National Cultural Development competition. Our United Nations Club just returned from debating in New York and our Robotics team just returned from New York also after winning several awards in the First US Robotics Competition.

Our performance in external examinations is improving as we scored 91% passes with 40% distinctions in English Language and 85% passes in Mathematics. Our target is to return to the top ten schools in Jamaica in three years.

We are indebted to the Jamaica College Old Boys' Associations of Florida and New York as your contributions to the development of our boys have been significant and consistent. The Ziadie Scholarship has helped a needy boy who has demonstrated notable football and academic standards. Your financial and material support has ensured that JC can maintain high standards of equity in a diverse school population of 1900 boys. We applaud and thank you!

We continue to ask God to "build us up in body, mind and spirit, until we come to the full stature of the perfect man, Jesus Christ, our Lord".

Although most are high school alumni associations, there are six associations representing tertiary institutions, two associations representing primary schools, and two associations representing ex-soldiers and ex-policemen. Most associations have the non-profit or 501c3 status.


Jamaican Alumni Associations are important agents of change. They have contributed thousands of dollars to build new educational facilities, and renovate existing educational infrastructure in Jamaica. The associations provide financial assistance to schools in Jamaica through scholarships, breakfast and lunch feeding programs, and to sporting programs like "Champs", Manning Cup and the Penn Relays. Some have even assisted students that have graduated from high schools and are pursuing advanced degrees. In south Florida, Jamaican alumni associations have sponsored toy drives, worked with Habitat for Humanity to help refurbish homes, fed the poor at Thanksgiving, and sponsored numerous health fairs.

In 2010, the Coalition of Jamaican Alumni Associations of Florida (CJAAF) Inc., was incorporated and now serves as the umbrella organization for Jamaican alumni associations in Florida. The CJAAF was created to assist in the dissemination of information about Jamaican alumni associations registered in the State of Florida and to help in the streamlining of activities of these associations. Since its formation, the CJAAF through its *Coalition Monthly Newsletter*, has kept the Jamaican community in Florida informed about matters pertaining to education in Jamaica, provided information on events sponsored by alumni associations, and on many occasions, has partnered with other groups in Florida to provide lectures and seminars. Through its website www.cjaaf.info, the CJAAF links Jamaican alumni associations and provides alumni associations an opportunity to stage events together. As the umbrella organization, the CJAAF also acts as a liaison with education policy makers in Jamaica.



The 2016 manning cup season was truly a special one for the True Blues. Jamaica College the most successful school in the history of the Manning cup added more trophies to their already well designed trophy cabinet; walking away with the Manning Cup and Olivier Shield trophies respectively. Jamaica college played 6 first round group games winning all but one which they drew with St. Andrew Technical (STATHS) on their home ground. They would then advance to the flow Super Cup and Walker Cup knockout competitions.

Their Flow Super Cup run came to a premature end when they were knocked out in the first game of the tournament. The season was as great as ever for the 189 Old Hope road team taking into consideration all the challenges they faced leading up to the competitions and the tragedies that occur while the competition was in play.

St. George's College 2016 Manning Cup Season

The season started promisingly as wins against Tivoli High and Tarrant gave the team a positive feeling in not only retaining the Flow Cup but to win the big one, the Manning Cup. However, the 20th of September was to go down as one of the saddest day in the modern history of St. George's College. Our talented captain Dominic James would collapse in the seventh minute of the away game against Excelsior High. He was pronounced dead at hospital shortly afterwards. It devastated the STGC team and sent shockwaves throughout Jamaica

The Light Blues, with Coach Neville Bell showing great courage and backed by the STGC Administration pressed on with the season in the hope of a rebound. We had good wins against Greater Portmore and Tarrant High but found Excelsior High too much on our home turf. We lost 0-1 to Excelsior in a game that was a hint at was to come. In the replayed first game, we needed to beat Excelsior. It was not to happen as the game ended 2-2. In the end, we ended up second in the group which meant that we would be out of both the Flow and the Walker Cups.

In the Second Round, we would face the very strong Wolmer's Boys, the eventual winner of the 2016 Flow Cup. We had wins against Haile Selassie and St. Catherine High. However, we were beaten by Wolmer's 2-0 and this ended our campaign for 2016.

Preparations are now in place for the 2017 season with initiation of the Elite Football Program at STGC where Under 16 talented footballers train three times a week in the off season. Tied in to this is a strong academic component where the students do Math, English, Spanish and Computing. We think this the first of its kind in Jamaica.

We look forward to the 2017-18 football season in which we intend to come on with a BANG!!!

I played on six St. George's College (StGC) teams: one Colts, four Mannings, and the 1973 team. I enjoyed playing on everyone of those teams, win, lose or draw. I played with some tremendous players, but I must admit to a special affection for the 1974 team. It was my first team as captain. It was an inexperienced team that faced some challenging obstacles and showed the courage to face those obstacles and turn into players that represented StGC with *Pride* and *Dignity*. Coming into the 1974 season there were some concerns. That summer's tryouts saw only two players with any Manning Cup experience, myself and Donovan Clarke (*Musclehead*).

Manning Cup takes players and fans on an unbelievable rollercoaster ride of emotions, from sorrow and heartbreak to jubilation and celebration. It brings excitement, hype, glamour, fame, some great football, and I must admit, the increased chances of attracting the fairer sex, the ladies, lol. It also brings the stress

of expectations for both fans and players. The pressure of not losing to your arch rivals. The pressure of carrying the weight of your school's pride on your shoulders. During the 1960's coming into the 1970's George's had built a reputation of great teams and great players. A reputation that had started to wane a little especially in comparison to our counterparts across the street, Kingston College.

So here we were in 1974, I figured myself as an experienced forward and Musclehead as an experienced defender was a starting point. Add to that we had Trevor Speedy Palmer who had an excellent season at center half, a very capable goalkeeper in Paul Miller, Carlton Bolton forward and Cyril Cornwall midfield, all from the 1973 Team.

Jamaica College (JC) was our first Manning Cup match, a contender for the Championship. How was this young team going to respond to the negative press, the opinion that we were going to get beat handily by JC. Standing in the tunnel at the Stadium, I look across at the JC players, Sinclair, Coleman, Pennycooke, Bond, Woodstock, Shenk, Herbie Nelson (RIP), some of the best schoolboy players. Early in the match Herbie Nelson gets a through pass just outside our 18 yard box. Bobby Lue closes from the left. They clash like two gladiators in the ring. I hear the thunderous sound of two boots coming together



with force with the ball in between. Herbie falls forward, Bobby Lue standing there triumphant, ball at his feet. JC was in for a fight. The Gleaner would write that George's dominated the first part of the match with clever short passes. They would also give credit to Bobby Lue, Pablo Chin, and goalkeeper Paul Miller for keeping the JC forwards at bay. My midfield partner now was Deecee Cover. He was roaming all over the midfield disrupting plays undaunted that it was Shenk and Woodstock we were up against. Musclehead on the leftwing using his low center of gravity to ride tackles and be a nuisance to the JC defense. We battled JC straight up. Then it happened. Mitchell gets a pass from Shenk and was able to loop it into our goal. We were inside of 5 minutes left in the match. Herbie Nelson scrambles home a second with only a couple minutes left, heartbreaking. All that effort and we still fell short. I sat on the floor, back against the wall in the tunnel, towel over my head in the aftermath of the match. It hurt. This young team had just played their hearts out, left everything on that Stadium Field only to lose in the cruelest of way. When it looked like we could pull off the impossible and at least draw with the mighty JC, and have it snatched away in the dying minutes of the match, yeah it hurt. In the end the consolation was, JC went on to become Manning Cup Champions. We lost to the best.

The question now was how will this team respond to this setback. The response was no losses the rest of the competition with only one goal conceded in five matches.

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
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
